2017 Boise Ice Classic

April 28-30, 2017

The Boise Ice Classic will be conducted in accordance with the rules and regulations of U.S. Figure Skating, as set forth in the current rulebook, as well as any pertinent updates which have been posted on the U.S. Figure Skating website.

This competition is open to all eligible, restricted, reinstated or readmitted persons as defined by the Eligibility Rules, and is a currently registered member of a U.S. Figure Skating member club, a collegiate club or an individual member in accordance with the current rulebook. Please refer to the current rulebook for non-U.S. Citizens.

A test session will also be hosted by the Boise Figure Skating Club on April 28, 2017. Registration for the Test Session must be submitted online through www.entryeeze.com. Log into the Boise FSC membership page and then click the link for test registration.

ELIGIBILITY/TEST LEVEL:

Test level: Competition level is the highest test passed as of the entry deadline in the discipline the skater is entering. Entrants may skate one level above that for which they qualify, but they may not skate down in any event and not at multiple levels in the same event during the same competition. Skaters who placed in the top four in a final round of their last qualifying competition in their divisions must move up one level, except for novice and higher.

Age restrictions/requirements: Skaters entering juvenile free skate events (Well Balanced Program) must be under 14 years of age on close of entries March 31, 2017. Skaters entering open juvenile free skate events (Well Balanced Program), must be at least 14 years of age on close of entries on March 31, 2017.

Skaters entering beginner-pre-juvenile events will be divided as closely as possible by age should the number of entries warrant more than one group.

The LOC and Chief Referee reserve the right to combine events. Girls and Boys may be combined in events at the discretion of the referee as per the US Figure skating rules.

ENTRIES: Entries must be received online through the Boise Ice Classic page at www.entryeeze.com by March 31, 2017, at midnight. Late entries will be accepted at the discretion of the Chief Referee and the Boise Figure Skating Club and will be subject to a \$30.00 late entry fee. No entries will be accepted after the schedule has been completed.

<u>FEES:</u> The entry fee for no-test through adult masters will be \$90.00 for the first event and \$35.00 for each subsequent event entered.

A Hospitality Fee of \$5.00 will be charged per skater.

<u>REFUND POLICY</u> There will be no refunds given for withdrawal after the close of the entries on March 31, 2017.

There will be no refunds for medical withdrawals. The online processing fees are not refundable. Checks returned for non-sufficient funds and contested credit card charges will be issued a \$25.00 fee. Payment of the fee will be requested before the skater is allowed to participate in practice ice or events. Notification of competition and practice ice times will be available on www.entryeeze.com.

Refunds will be issued in accordance with Rule 3047 and only if the event is not held. In any event with only one entry, the skater will be offered the choice of either competing as an individual competitor in accordance with Rule 3045A without a refund, or withdrawing from the event and receiving a refund.

The LOC and Chief Referee reserve the right to combine events.

***You will be asked the following "survey" question during Entryeeze registration: "If you are the only skater in any of the events you entered, would you prefer to skate anyway, or withdraw from the single skater event with a refund." Your response to this question is final and will help us process the schedule quicker.

All refunds, minus the online process fee, will be returned to your credit card within 30 days of the end of the competition based on determination of the LOC that a refund is due. The online processing fee is not refundable for any reason. No refunds will be issued for injuries.

CD's will still be required as backup. CD's must have only one track. Skaters should have a spare CD nearby in the rink during their performance.

JUDGING SYSTEM:

The International Judging System (IJS) will be used for the following events:

- Well Balanced Program free skate events, no test senior and adult gold and masters.
- Short program events, intermediate senior

All competitors skating in these events need to submit the planned program content form with their entry via www.entryeeze.com, online. Revisions to a skater's PPC will be accepted via EntryEeze thru April 23, 2017. Competitors not submitting required PPC's at www.entryeeze.com will be required to provide a paper PPC prior to registering and will be subject to a \$30.00 late fee.

All other events will be judged using the 6.0 judging system. The Boise FSC reserves the right to use the 6.0 judging system for some events if IJS qualified officials are unavailable.

REGISTRATION:

The official registration desk will be located at the lobby of Idaho Ice World and will be open one hour before the first competitive event and run through the last event of the last day. All skaters are required to register 30-60 minutes before their scheduled event.

<u>PRACTICE ICE:</u> Reservations for practice ice must be <u>made and paid for at the time of entry</u>. Practice sessions will be held for each day of the competition. Practice ice will be \$15 per 20-minute session. Requests for practice ice will be handled through the online entry process and is a part of your entry form. Sign up for one practice session per event entered. No music will be played during practice ice.

The Boise Figure Skating Club cannot offer specific times for practice ice until the number of competitors and events are known. Once the competition schedule is finalized by the Chief Referee, specific practice ice times will be made available to complement the competition schedule. At such time, skaters will be able to log into their account in www.entryeeze.com and select practice ice times.

After the close of registration and the initial practice ice reservation period, additional practice ice sessions may become available. This will be announced through www.entryeeze.com. Please ensure that the email address submitted during online entry is accurate in order to receive updates about practice ice availability and scheduling.

Practice ice may also be sold at the registration desk during the competition on a first-come, first-serve basis for \$20 per each 20 minute session, including drop-ins. There will be no refunds for those who do not appear for their reserved practice session. Every effort will be made to schedule practice ice on the same day as the event, but this is not guaranteed.

<u>PHOTOGRAPHY/VIDEOGRAPHY</u>: A Photographer will be providing photos for future purchase. No videographer is scheduled to attend at this time. Due to agreements with our photographer, photos and videotaping is limited to your own skater. Additionally, for the safety of the skaters, flash photography is not permitted in the arena at any time.

AWARDS: Each group will receive awards immediately following the posting of results for the event.

Medals will be given to the top four places of each event.

SPECIAL AWARD:

The Shauna Hill Artistry Award. Shauna Hill was a long time member of the Boise Figure Skating Club. Her optimism and dedication have inspired her peers and competitors. She will always be remembered for her passion and enthusiasm to the sport of figure skating and to all of those around her.

The judges will give this special award to three skaters who demonstrate excellence in artistry in the **Showcase Dramatic event** at the Boise Ice Classic. Three Artistic Award trophies will be given. One each for a skater level Pre-Preliminary and below, Preliminary thru Pre-Juvenile, and Juvenile and above, These awards are sponsored by Shauna's parents, Ted and Heidi Hill.

Skaters previously given the award the prior year (2016) are not eligible for an award this year. After this year (2017), awarded skaters at any level may not receive the award again for three years (eligible again in 2020.)

OFFICIAL NOTICES: An official bulletin board will be maintained at Idaho Ice World. It is the responsibility of each competitor, parent and coach to check the bulletin board frequently for any schedule changes and/or additional information. Skaters are requested to arrive 60 minutes prior to the scheduled time of their event. A tentative schedule of events will be posted prior to the competition. The official schedule showing starting times for each event and the draw will be posted on the bulletin board. The official schedule supersedes all other schedules. Notices posted on this bulletin board are considered as sufficient notice to all competitors.

INFORMATION REGARDING COACHES:

U.S. Figure Skating Rule MR 5.11 Coach Registration

In order to be granted access to work within U.S. Figure Skating sanctioned activities, each coach must complete the following requirements on an annual basis by July 1:

- A. Must be a current full member of U.S. Figure Skating either through a member club or as an individual member;
- B. Must complete the coach registration process through the U.S. Figure Skating Members Only site, submit proper payment for the annual registration fee of \$30 and, if 18 years of age or older, successfully pass the background screen.
- C. Must complete the appropriate CER courses (A, B, C or D) depending on the highest level of students being coached as of July 1. See rule MR 5.12.
- D. Must submit proof of current general liability insurance with limits of \$1 million per occurrence/\$5 million aggregate.

For Learn to Skate USA ONLY coaches - Any person, 18 and older, instructing in a U.S. Figure Skating Learn to Skate USA Program must have successfully passed the annual background screen and be registered as a Learn to Skate USA instructor member.

The local organizing committee/club will have a list of compliant coaches who are cleared for a credential at the competition. Coaches will need to check in at the event registration desk and show a government issued photo I.D. to receive a credential.

If a coach cannot provide a photo I.D. and is not on the list or cannot produce the necessary documents, he or she will not be allowed a credential – <u>no exceptions</u>. We strongly urge all coaches to have their cards with them. Non-credentialed coaches will not be permitted in the designated coaching area at rink side during events including practice sessions. Coaching at U.S. Figure Skating events without proper registration is an ethics violation which is reported to U.S. Figure Skating and PSA.

COMPULSORY MOVES

General event parameters: No-Test – Juvenile: Elements skated on 1/2 ice

- Elements may be performed only once
- Music is not allowed

NONQUALIFYING COMPETITION SHOWCASE GUIDELINES

EVENTS:

Qualifications and requirements for No-Test to Senior Showcase events can be found with the link below: http://www.usfsa.org/shell?id=59260

Single Events are:

- 1. <u>Dramatic Entertainment</u>: Programs should express intense emotional connection and investment in the music, choreography and theme concept through related skating movements, gestures and physical actions. The entire gamut of emotions may be expressed including intense joy and/or introspectiveness. Props and Scenery ARE permitted.
- 2. <u>Light Entertainment:</u> Programs should express a carefree concept or storyline designed to uplift and entertain the audience through related skating movements, gestures and physical actions. Props and Scenery ARE permitted.
- 3. Interpretive: The program will be a performance choreographed by the competitor, unaccompanied and unassisted, to music that is supplied by the LOC. Programs should incorporate various elements of expressive movement and skating moves, to enhance the skater's interpretation of the music, rather than technical elements. The music will be played continuously during a 30-minute off ice session in a room. The room will be attended only by the adult monitor assigned to play the music, and the competing skaters. The music will be played twice during a warm-up on full ice. After the warm up skaters will go back to the room, with no music being played. Skaters will be brought to the ice when the previous skater finishes. All competitors in an event will interpret the same music. Props are permitted but must be brought into the room prior to listening to the music, and be taken to the ice only when the skater is called to perform. Props may not be pre-positioned on the performance surface.
- 4. <u>Duets</u> are theatrical performances by any two competitors. Props and Scenery ARE permitted. Skaters may enter only one each duet.

PERFORMANCE TIMES:

- 1. Interpretive:
 - 1. Pre-juvenile and below: 1:00 max
 - 2. Juvenile thru novice: 1:30 max
 - 3. Junior and senior: 1:30 max
 - 4. Teen and young adult: 1:30 max
 - 5. All adult events: 1:30 max
- 2. Light and Dramatic Entertainment:
 - 1. No test, pre-preliminary (these levels do not qualify for National Showcase): 1:30 max
 - 2. Preliminary and pre-juvenile: 1:40 max
 - 3. Juvenile thru novice: 2:10 max
 - 4. Junior and senior: 2:40 max
 - 5. Teen and Young adult: 2:10 max
 - 6. Adult Bronze-Adult Gold and Masters: 1:40 max

3. Duets:

1. Duets: Same as for Light and Dramatic Entertainment (Duets must compete at the highest test level (or one level higher) of the two skaters

Skaters may enter any or all of these singles events for which they are qualified by test level. Skaters cannot skate in different levels of the same event (example: event-Light Entertainment Level Junior skater would not be allowed to skate Light Entertainment Junior and Senior).

COSTUMES:

- 1. Costuming and make-up for showcase/theatrical/interpretive skating programs should enhance the feeling created by the performance, and reflect the meaning of the story or theme.
- 2. Costumes rules for free skate do not apply for showcase/theatrical/interpretive skating. Ornaments and hair accessories must be secure.
- 3. No bobby pins, feathers, hair accessories, or anything else that may fall to the ice and be hazardous to the skaters are allowed. A 0.1 deduction will be taken.

TIMING:

Timing will begin with the first purposeful movement of any competitor. For performances that are over or under the time allotment, standard time deductions will apply as per U.S. Figure Skating's current rulebook. Timing will cease when the skater comes to a complete stop.

JUDGING AND MARKING:

- 1. Performances will be judged from an entertainment standpoint, for theatrical and artistic qualities.
- 2. Technical skating skills and difficulty will not be rewarded as such; however, skating must be the major element of the performance and be of sufficient quality to support the selected theatrical elements.
- 3. Unintended falls, poorly executed skating elements and obvious losses of control will negatively affect the competitor's/team's marks.
- 4. Jump difficulty is not rewarded in showcase; therefore jumps, if choreographed, should be performed with style, flow and confidence.
- 5. Theatrical elements evaluated will include are but not limited to:
 - a. Reflection of the musicality as it pertains to the concept of the program
 - b. Projection
 - c. Energy
 - d. Timing
 - e. Acting
 - f. Skating skills that relate to the music
 - g. Age Appropriateness to skater
 - h. Use of props and scenery
 - i. Interaction (Duets and Ensembles only)
 - j. Note: Prolonged pauses to express lyrics are discouraged
- 6. The 6.0 judging system will be used. One mark will be awarded by each judge for each performance. No technical skating mark will be awarded.
- 7. Deductions will apply for negligence relating to: costumes, props, program times.

SCENERY/PROPS WHEN ALLOWED

Props and scenery must be placed and removed by the competitor unaided within one minute total on and off. Anyone not skating is not allowed to step on the ice.

- The use of scenery and/or props is not mandatory.
- All scenery will be portable and not require any mechanical means for transportation (i.e. forklift, etc) its movement will be the responsibility of the skater or teams.
- For insurance reasons no propulsion devices will be permitted. This includes items such as cannons as well as trampolines.
- The use of smoke, fire, liquids, live animals, feathers, bubble machines or any substance that may harm the ice surface and/or skaters is not permitted.
- No mirrors or glass of any kind is allowed on the ice.
- TRAMPOLINES OR OTHER SUCH APPARATUS USED TO ASSIST SKATERS JUMPING INTO THE AIR IS NOT PERMITTED. A 0.2 deduction will be taken

- There will be no countdown of timing announced for single skaters or duets
- If a competitor has any doubt concerning the safety of his/her number, the Chief Referee should be consulted.

SCENERY BREAK DOWN

At the completion of the performance when removing the props from the ice the skaters may not step off the ice. A 0.2 deduction will be taken.

A 0.2 deduction will be assessed by the referee against each judges' mark for each five seconds in excess of the time allowed for the performance, for handling props and scenery and for scenery assistance.

SPECIFICS:

- **A.** There is no minimum time requirement for any event.
- **B.** Events will not be segregated by gender.
- **C.** There will be a 0.2 deduction for each 5 seconds in excess of the maximum performance and prop placement times.
- **D.** Timing starts with the first purposeful motion of the body and ends when motion stops.
- **E.** Spotlights and curtains are not required for showcase events at non-qualifying competitions.

Skaters representing another governing body must meet that body's closest possible equivalent to the specified U.S. Figure Skating test requirement. The referee's decision will be final.

The competition is open to ALL skaters who are current eligible (ER 1.00) members of either the Learn to Skate USA Program and/or are full members of U.S. Figure Skating. To be eligible, skaters must have submitted a membership application or be a member in good standing. Members of other organizations are eligible to compete but must be registered with the host Learn to Skate USA program/club or any other Learn to Skate USA Program/club.

Eligibility: will be based on skill level as of closing date of entries, March 31, 2017.

All Snowplow Sam and Basic 1-6, skaters must skate at highest level passed or one level higher and NO official U.S. Figure Skating tests may have been passed including MIF or individual dances.

For the Pre-free skate, free skate 1-6, and Well Balanced levels, eligibility will be based only upon highest free skate test level passed (Moves in the Field test level will not determine skater's competitive level). Skaters may skate at highest level passed OR one level higher, but not both levels in the same event during the same competition. Skaters may not compete at more than one level in the same type event at the same competition.

It is very important to the success of the competition that skaters are placed in the correct divisions. If, for whatever reason, the Local Organizing Committee discovers that a skater has been placed in a category that is below his/her class level, the chairman and referee will have the option to move the skater into the proper division, even if this has to be done the day of the competition. This will ensure that every event is as fair as possible to the competitors.

Skaters must be in the rink and ready to skate 60 minutes before their event is scheduled to begin. Events will not be delayed for skaters who arrive late.

INFORMATION REGARDING COACHES In accordance with current rules, all coaches participating in this event must be registered with U.S. Figure Skating. For more information on the registration process, please visit the USFS website. The Boise Figure Skating Club will provide all registered coaches with a credential. Every coach in attendance will be required to check in at the registration desk and must show a picture I.D. to receive their credential. The Boise Figure Skating Club strongly recommends that coaches also bring any registration confirmation materials. Coaches must wear their badge at all times when coaching skaters at rink side. Ice monitors will be instructed to ensure that any coach standing at rink side has his or her credential.

FOR LEARN TO SKATE USA COACHES ONLY - Any person, 18 and older, instructing in a U.S. Figure Skating Compete USA Program must have successfully passed the annual background screen and be registered as a Learn to Skate USA instructor member.

SHOWCASE EVENTS:

Showcase events are open to skaters in Basic, Free Skate, Limited Beginner through Preliminary and Adult Bronze. Groups will be divided by number of entries and ages if possible. Skaters must enter at the same level as their free skate event or highest test level of skater's in the group ensemble or production number. If a free skate event is not being entered, skaters must enter at their current test level or one level higher. Vocal music is permitted.

Show costumes are permitted, as long as they do not touch or drag on the ice. Props and scenery must be placed and removed by unaided singles and duet competitors within one minute and by unaided ensemble contestants within two minutes for setup and two minutes for removal. A 0.2 deduction will be assessed by the referee against each judge's mark for each five seconds in excess of the time allowed for the performance, for handling props and scenery and for scenery assistance.

Performances will be judged from an entertainment standpoint, for theatrical qualities. Technical skating skills and difficulty will not be rewarded as such; however, skating must be the major element of the performance and be of sufficient quality to support the selected theatrical elements. Unintended falls, poorly executed skating elements and obvious losses of control will reduce contestant's marks. Jump difficulty is not rewarded in showcase; therefore jumps, if choreographed, should be performed with style, flow and confidence. Theatrical elements evaluated will include energy, poise, acting, pantomime, eye contact, choreography, form/extension and the use of props and ice.

6.0 Judging will be used. Deductions will be made for skaters including technical elements not permitted in the event description.

* For specific guidelines regarding the conduct of Showcase competitions, refer to the Nonqualifying Showcase Guidelines posted on the USFSA website.

Showcase categories may include:

- Levels can be subdivided, if necessary, depending on entry numbers and event set up
- Dramatic entertainment: Showcase program utilizing intense emotional skating quality to depict choreographic theme.
- Light entertainment: Showcase program emphasizing such choreographic expressive qualities such as comedy, love and mime while incorporating skating skills.

• Duets: Theatrical/artistic performances by any competitors.

INTERPRETIVE PROGRAM:

Competition Format

The Organizing Committee must pre-select and edit musical choices appropriate for these events. During the warm-up, skaters will hear the selection of music twice. Following the warm-up, all skaters except for the first skater will be escorted to a soundproof locker room or another area of the arena. The first skater will hear the music one more time and then perform a program to the music. As each skater performs, the next skater in line will be allowed to hear the music for the third time before they perform to the music. The listening skater will not be allowed to view the performing skater.

Levels

Levels should be broken by ability with ages divided appropriately.

Judging Rules:

Skaters are judged on originality, pattern, technical (the ability to include jumps and spins) and music interpretation/expression.

Spins and jumps performed must be appropriate to competition level.

Coaching: There is to be no instruction allowed during this event from coaches, parents, or fellow skaters. Staging area must be kept clear except for ice monitor and listening competitor.

The Therapeutic Badge Program is designed to help physically challenged skaters develop skills and enhance their skating experience. 



Element 1: Skate Forward




Participant starts at goal line and propels themselves to the center line.

Element 2: Slalom




Participant will maneuver around 6-8 cones in a slalom pattern.
